Sita Hidayah is a lecturer at the Department of Anthropology, Gadjah Mada University (UGM) Yogyakarta-Indonesia.

She received her doctoral degree from the Institut für Ethnologie Albert-Ludwigs Universität, Freiburg Germany. She is part of the transcultural tandem project Uni-Freiburg and UGM (2004-2023). She is currently working with Dr. Gabriele Weichart on a collaborative and comparative study focusing on edible insects in both Austria and Indonesia funded by ASEA-UNINET 2023.

This presentation will discuss the various approaches and articulations of decolonializing anthropology in Indonesia. This talk focuses on efforts to interpret the decolonization of knowledges and practices in a national university, Universitas Gadjah Mada-Indonesia. These efforts are manifested, for example, in the "post-colonial subjects" curriculum, teaching methods, and subjects. Creative writing, participatory community services, multi-modal ethnographic practices, collaborative research methods, and multimedia and interactive presentations and exhibitions of students' research projects have been important elements of the teaching methods in the Department of Anthropology at UGM in recent years. There are strategies for overcoming barriers to accessing, discussing, and producing anthropological knowledge to accommodate diversity of students, multiplicity of voices, and to balance the working of power against the increasing neoliberalization of Indonesian educational system and institutions.

It is a legitimate question to ask whether these decolonizing knowledge and practices result in genuine changes in relationships between people, institutions, and academic environment in Indonesia and beyond. This eventually leads to the questions of what anthropological knowledge and practices from Indonesian perspectives are and how Indonesians envision the future of Anthropology.
